OUR CONSCIENCE

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INTRODUCTION

- A. TEXT: "Brethren I have lived before God in all good conscience....v. 1.
- B. SETTING: Paul before the council, and high priest.
 - 1. Before he became a Christian.
 - a. Paul thought he was doing right in persecuting Christians.
 - b. *the mere fact that a man is conscientious does not prove that he is right or innocent.
 - 2. After he became a Christian.
 - a. His actions have totally changed.
 - b. He is now doing the opposite of what he was doing.
 - c. Yet at both times he lived with a "good conscience".
 - 3. **How could he have had a "good conscience" in both cases?
- C. In studying the Conscience today we want to:
 - 1. Learn what it is
 - 2. What it does.
 - 3. How it affects our life.

WHAT IS THE CONSCIENCE

A. DEFINITION.

- 1. "A sense of consciousness of the moral goodness or blame-worthiness of ones own conduct, intentions, or character, together with a feeling of obligation to do right or be good".
- 2. "Hence, a faculty, power, or principle conceived to decide as to the moral quality of one's own thoughts or acts, enjoining what is good." (Webster).
- B. Derived from Greek word rendered "consciousness" and in <u>Heb. 10:2</u> the obvious meaning is the notion of awareness.
- C. The realization of our obligation to avoid that which the judgment condemns, and to follow that which the judgment approves.

DOES AND DOES NOT

- A. THINGS THE CONSCIENCE DOES.
 - 1. It convicts (John 8:9).
 - 2. Bears Witness (Rom. 2:15).
 - 3. Testifies (II Cor. 1:12).
 - 4. Endures grief (I Pet. 2:19).
- B. THINGS THE CONSCIENCE DOES NOT DO.
 - 1. It has nothing whatsoever to do with determining what is right and what is wrong...this is the faculty of judgment.

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- 2. It does not make a thing right by approval....Thinking that is right to steal doesn't make it right.
- C. Basically, the Conscience monitors one's thoughts, motive, actions and manner of life.

EDUCATION OF JUDGMENT

- A. JUDGMENT IS A CREATURE OF EDUCATION.
 - 1. I Tim. 2:15 "Study to show....
 - 2. Our judgment is determined by our knowledge.
 - 3. This underscores the absolute importance of knowing God's Word.!
- B. THUS OUR ACTIONS IN LIFE ARE DETERMINED BY OUR KNOWLEDGE...WHICH DETERMINES OUR JUDGMENT.
- C. The role of our Conscience is to approve or disapprove our actions in regard to our judgment.
 - 1. Our conscience approves when our actions is in harmony with our judgment.
 - 2. Our Conscience disapproves, condemns when our actions is in violation of our judgment.
- D. REMEMBER OUR QUESTION ABOUT PAUL?
 - 1. Paul's actions was in harmony with his judgment... Even when judgment was wrong.
 - 2. As his knowledge and judgment changed, so did his actions and HIS CONSCIENCE APPROVED WHAT HE DID.

DIFFERENT STATES OF:

- A. A righteous conscience.
- B. A good conscience (I Tim. 1:1-5; 1:19; Heb. 13:18).
- C. A pure conscience (I Tim. 3:9). D. A weak Conscience (I Cor. 8:12) E. A seared conscience d(I Tim. 4:2). F. A defiled conscience (Titus 1:15).
- G. An evil Conscience (Heb. 10:22).

EXAMPLE

- A. "And Paul, looking steadfastly on the council, said, Brethren, I have lived before God in all good conscience until this day" (Acts 23:1).
- B. "I thank him that enabled me, even Christ Jesus our Lord, for that he counted me faithful, appointing me to his service; though I was before a blasphemer, and a persecutor, and injurious: howbeit I obtained mercy, because I did it ignorantly in unbelief; (I Tim. 1:12ff).

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CONCLUSION

- A. WHAT WE THINK HOWEVER, DOES NOT DETERMINE WHAT IS RIGHT OR WRONG.
 - Many people think it is the sole criterion of conduct...
 It is some times referred to as "the voice of God."
- B. This gross and hurtful error prompts multitudes of people today......
 - 1. To disregard the teachings of the scripture.
 - 2. And to follow their "inner leading".
