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INTRODUCTION

- 1. "A copy of this law" or "The second Law".
- 2. However it is more of a commentary than a history.
- 3. A new crisis thus a repetition of the laws on the eve of the crossing of the Jordan into Canaan.
- 4. So the book only covers one or two months of time.
- 5. The old generation had died (except). A new generation is on the scene.
- 6. To impress their hearts with a deep sense of their duty and obligation to God.
- 7. The shema in the book of Deut. Sums up the supreme duty of man to, "love Jehovah thy God with all thy heart, and will all thy soul, and will all thy might." (6:4-9).
- 8. An analysis by chapters reveal:
 - a. HISTORICAL (1-4) A review of Israel's history.
 - b. **HORTATORY** (5-26) A review of the Law.
 - c. **PROPHETIC** (27-30) Israel's future foretold.
 - d. PATHETIC (31-34) The last days of Moses.

Higher Critics Versus the Highest Criti

- A. Change (amazing) in religious thinking between A.D. 1800 1900.
 - 1. Until 19th C. almost all that claimed to follow the Bible, believed the Bible was verbally inspired and the infallible revelation.
 - 2. But the new theologians, particularly in Germany, held up the Old and new Testaments to ridicule.
 - 3. Israel's religion developed from belief in tribal deities.
 - 4. Deuteronomy was consigned to the 7th C. B.C. and the idea of Mosaic authorship of the Pentateuch was considered inadmissible.
- B. All sorts of theories were advanced to deny the Book
 - 1. Moses and Israel from Egypt were non-historical.
 - 2. Moses could not have written...because writing was not yet developed.
 - 3. All of these later total disproved.

Moral & Spiritual Values			

A. The Moral and Spiritual tone of Deut. Is clearly reflected in the keywords.

- 1. Thou shalt" Suggest the positive side of obedience.
- 2. "Thou shalt not" Indicates the need for negative restrictions.
- 3. 11:26-28.....both seen.
- B. Spiritual Value Attested by Jesus.
 - 1. In hour of His great temptation.
 - 2. Three times He met the temptations of Satan with the words, "It is written" (Matt. 4).
 - 3. In each case a quotation from Deuteronomy.
- C. From Deut. That Jesus summarized the entire Old Covenant in a single statement. (Matt. 22:37-40; cf Deut. 6:5).
