INTRODUCTION TO CORINTHIANS

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INTRODUCTION

A. CITY OF CORINTH:

- 1. An ancient city having been established about 1350 B.C.
- 2. In 146 B.D. rebelled against Rome and was completely destroyed. Rebuilt in 46 B.C. by Julius Caesar.
- 3. Situated on an Isthmus between two seas it was natural that it developed into a great city. Controlled the sea trade and land trade of Greece.
- 4. A city filled with idols and known throughout the world for its immorality. The temple of Aphrodeite, known to Romans as Venus, owned a 1000 harlots who's sandal message "Follow Me". To Corinthianize was to debase to bring to the lowest moral level.
- 5. Into this city Paul came in A.D. 51 or 52. Alone, broke, and si-dis-couraged from what had happened at Athens.
- B. At this time Corinth was a city of some 600,000 people. Paul stayed there a year and a half. Then in about 57 A.D. from Ephesus wrote letter to the church in Corinth.

THE BASIC MESSAGE

- A. First, the Christ and His gospel constitute the solution to every problem, and the answer to every question.
- B. SECOND, the took is designed to encourage brethren to be faithful to God and His will. (1:9; 15:1-2; 15:58).

AN AMAZING PARADOX

- A. Corinth was a wicked, corrupt, licentious city. A city of idolatry.
- B. The church of God is composed of those who are "called out of" and who are "separated from" the world.
- C. What a contrast! The city of Corinth and the church of God.
- D. Broad-mindedness led to toleration of wickedness.
 - 1. It was bad when Lot moved his house into Sodom; IT WAS FAR WORSE WHEN SODOM MOVED INTO HIS HOUSE.
 - 2. It is good for a boat to be in the water, but bad for water to be in boat.
 - 3. It was good for the church to be in Corinth, but it was bad for Corinth to be in the church.

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CHURCH PROBLEMS

A. THE CHURCH HAS ALWAYS HAD PROBLEMS!

- 1. On the Divine side it is absolute perfection.
- 2. On the human side there are imperfections.
- 3. Every problem is on the human side.

B. <u>PROBLEM OF DIVISION:</u> (1:10 - 4:21).

- 1. God desires unity. Christ prayed for unity, and brethren are instructed to "keep the unity of the Spirit."
- 2. Not unity at any price.....But unity upon the terms of Gospel of Christ.

C. OF FAILURE TO GROW: (3:1-3).

- 1. When one is baptized into Christ he is a babe, regardless of his age.
- 2. But we cannot be pleasing to God unless we grow.
- 3. We grow by study, prayer, faithful attendance and by diligent service.

D. TOLERATION OF SIN:

- 1. They failed to recognize "a little leaven leaveneth the whole lump."
- 2. Instead of mourning they were "puffed up."
- 3. Church discipline (withdrawal of fellowship) is definitely demanded by the Bible teaching.

E. OF SINFUL LITIGATION:

- 1. Brethren over "the smallest matters"...trivial, trifling, petty. "
- 2. Paul instructs that all such action is sin.

F. PROBLEMS RELATING TO MARRIAGE:

- 1. Relationship between husband and wife. If one is an unbeliever.
- 2. Whether to marry or not...or marry again after husband/wife dies.

G. RELATED TO LORD'S SUPPER: Paul stressed:

- 1. That the Supper is to be observed "in remembrance" of Christ.
- 2. It proclaims the Lord's death til he come.
- 3. That it has to be partaken of in a worthy manner.
- 4. That personal examination is necessary.
- H. OF SPIRITUAL GIFTS.... of the Resurrection...even the Contribution.

SOLUTION

When brethren are determined to think as the Bible teaches and speak and DO what the Bible teaches they will **BE** what the Bible teaches. (1:10).

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The Gospel Is Power

- A. In Romans 1:16 Paul declares.....
- B. One of the greatest illustrations of the power of the gospel is found in:
 - 1. I Corinthians 6:9-=11; READ
 - 2. "And such were some of you"...Note past tense. What had happened?
 - 3. "But ye were washed, but ye were sanctified, but ye were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the Spirit of our God."
- C. That power which can take a sorry, sinful, low-down human being and transform him into an upright, honorable citizen of the Kingdom of God is power indeed! **Thank God for the power of the gospel.**
