PHILIPPIANS

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INTRODUCTION

- A. Contains one of the most profound and sublime doctrinal passages of the entire New Testament.
 - 1. Philippians 2:5-9
 - 2. It affirms the <u>divinity of Christ, His pre-existence, His equality with the</u> <u>Father, His Incarnation, His perfect Humanity, His death upon the Cross</u> and His glorious exaltation.
- B. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND:
 - 1. Author: From the pen of the apostle Paul.
 - 2. CITY: Was established in 368 B.C. Philip of Macedonia
 - a. Near rich gold mines
 - b. A Roman Colony...Free City....Roman citizenship privileges.
 - c. The Ignatian Way.
 - THE CHURCH: Established by Paul on 2nd Missionary Journey. 52 A.D.
 a. Lydia
 - b. Slave girl
 - c. Jailor
 - d. **From absence of "we" passages in Acts it appears that Luke spent 7 or 8 years in the city. (Acts 16-19).
 - 4. DATE AND PLACE: Paul probably wrote near end of imprisonment from Rome about 63 A.D.
 - 5. OCCASION: A very personal letter...A "Thank You" note.

PURPOSE

- A. Paul appears to have had a number of reasons for writing to the Philippians.
 - 1. To acknowledge the gifts that they had sent to him. (4:10)
 - 2. To give news of his own circumstances and to take away their concern that his imprisonment might have been a set-back for the gospel (1:12-26).
 - 3. To explain why he was sending Epaphroditus back to them. (2:25-30).
 - 4. To address the dangers of divisions and party spirit among the Philippian Christians, and to exhort them to live and act and witness in the unity of the Spirit (1:27; 2:1-11; 4:2f).
 - 5. To make them aware of the danger of being influenced by the Judaizers and perhaps at the same time to warn them of the danger of a false perfectionism (3:12-16).
- B. Encouragement to endure and to trust their lives to their Lord in all things and under all circumstances (1:27-30; 2:12-18; 3:17-21; 4:4-9).

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OUTLINE

- A. FELLOWSHIP IN GOSPEL (Chapter 1).
 - 1. Consider the people involved in this fellowship, Paul, Timothy, etc.
 - 2. Fellowship as to its purpose promotes good out of evil. ("For me to live is Christ, and to die is gain"(1:21).
 - 3. The product of this fellowship "Let your manner of life be worthy of the gospel of Christ." Particular meaning because of their Roman citizenship.
- B. THE PATTERN OF THE GOSPEL (Chapter 2).
 - 1. Patter woven in 3 colors.
 - a. Unity; (b) Humility (c) Cooperation in Christ.
 - 2. Paul illustrates in the lives of Timothy & Epaphroditus how this gospel looks in human form.
- C. WARNINGS OF THE GOSPEL.
 - 1. Against false teachers.
 - 2. Against lagging (3:12).
 - 3. Against those who would teach that a Christian need not live like a citizen of heaven.
- D. EFFECTS OF THE GOSPEL:
 - 1. They will be new creatures with a new character (more later)
 - 2. They will have new capabilities, with new opportunities. ("*I can do all things in him that strengthened me*"

LESSONS IN LIVING

- A. THE ART OF REJOICING (4:4).
 - 1. A vital lesson for every Christian.
 - 2. Rome may separate him from his fellows, but can never separate him from his Lord.
 - 3. Circumstances had not made him hard of bitter.
- B. THE CHARACTERISTIC OF GENTLENESS (4:5).
 - 1. Is never an issue of weakness.
 - 2. Is ever the offspring of strength.
- C. THE CURE FOR CARE a most needed lesson (4:6).
 - 1. Worry is an alloy that mars and spoils.
 - 2. In this passage we have the ante-dote for worry.

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Lessons in Living cont.

- D. THE SENTINEL OF GOD'S PEACE (4:7).
 - 1. Peace is found in the absence of discord.
 - 2. This peace of God shall "guard your hearts and your thoughts in Christ Jesus.
 - 3. This is the figure of a siege Life surrounded by subtle foes.
 - 4. But within peace stands a sleepless sentinel and guard, LIFE IS SECURE.
- E. HOW AND UPON WHAT TO THINK IS HERE SET OUT (4:8).
 - 1. These things.
 - 2. READ.
- F. WE ARE TO PASS FROM THINKING TO DOING (9).
 - 1. Paul's example is worthy of our imitation.
 - 2. Impossible to have beautiful mind and a repulsive life.....or conversely.
