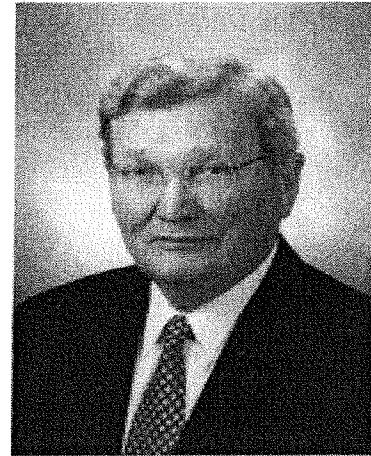
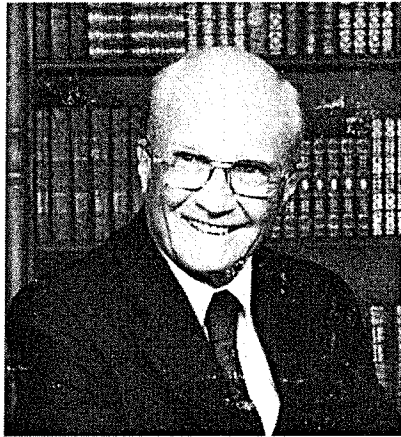

FOREWORD

Outlines of Bible History, by Roy H. Lanier Sr., has been a best-seller among churches of Christ since the author's inception of the workbooks beginning in 1928. Old Testament Part One was published at that time, and four other sections were added in succeeding years.

Originally all of the five books, Old Testament Parts One and Two, Life of Christ Parts One and Two, and Acts of the Apostles were published separately. However, by 1941, the demand for them had increased to the point that Lanier published them all in one binding. In our home, that combined book, *Outlines of Bible History*, was simply known as the "Big Book." In my early years, wrapping and shipping them, while my father was traveling fulltime in gospel meetings across the USA, became one of my main household jobs.

These books, both the individual ones and the "Big Book" continued to be best sellers through all the years. In 1941, when the Big Book was published, the individual books were in their fourth and fifth printing. *Old Testament Part One* (23,000), *Old Testament Part Two* (18,000), *Life of Christ Part One* (19,000), *Life of Christ Part Two* (20,000), and *Acts of the Apostles* (18,000) were the numbers published by that time.

By 1960, the individual books ceased to be published after going through five printings. Their numbers had increased to *Old Testament Part One* (33,000), *Old Testament Part Two* (28,000), *Life of Christ Part One* (29,000), *Life of Christ Part Two* (25,000), and *Acts of the Apostles* (28,000). When my father passed away in 1980, all the publishing was left to me. The Big Book has seen two re-printings since his passing, totaling over 20,000, and that has been without any advertising to the brotherhood.

Since these studies remain in demand, it was decided to use a different format in order to aid the student to keep notes. Thus, the five books are now being offered in single printings in a larger format that will enable answers and notes to be added by the student.

My sister, Dr. Joy Henshall, placed her editing genius at my disposal, and she has made these studies all the more readable. George and Patsy Keelin, of Utopia, Texas, who were former students of my father and me at the Bear Valley School of Preaching in Denver, Colorado, offered to do a final proof of the books. They did a scholarly and meticulous proofing, and it is hoped that these new editions will continue to be an effective offering to the public. Ed Smithson, of Ft. Worth, Texas, has printed the new formats, and he has also given invaluable aid by scanning and digitizing the books for our work. It is also appreciated that beautiful cover graphics could be used by Gustav Dore.

These studies have long been recognized for their depth and quality of study offered, particularly in Old Testament sections. It is hoped that such studies will continue to help Bible students attain more knowledge of the Lord and His great redemptive work.

PREFACE

(This Preface was published in 1941, the first year that my father published the "Big Book." It might be of interest to students one century removed, so it is included in all of the books published separately.)

This book consists of one hundred thirty-two lessons concerning God's dealings with the human race, beginning with the creation and closing with Luke's account of Paul in prison at Rome in the last chapter of The Acts. Standard works of the best scholars have been used to determine the chronology of events in an effort to present the lessons in chronological order. The books of Kings and Chronicles have been treated as one historical record, giving double references where both related the same events. And where the prophets made historical statements in their writings these references have been included according to the best chronology available.

The four gospel records have been treated as one biography of Christ, giving references where each writer mentioned the subject under consideration. The author has not tried to determine the chronology of events for himself in these books, but has used that given by McGarvey and Pendleton in their "Fourfold Gospel." Students will do well to use that book in their studies of these lessons on the Life of Christ.

This work has been very well received by the public. Churches all over the nation are using them for various classes, in Sunday Bible school, in mid-week services, and for ladies' Bible classes. The author is very grateful for this fine reception, and is pleased to know that the work is capable of being used for good. It is his sincere prayer that these lessons will continue to do good wherever used.
